# **INTRODUCTORY TOOLS**

#### 1. S.H.A.R.E.

Perhaps the most difficult barrier to presenting the gospel is introducing the subject of spiritual matters. In the following material, you will learn an effective means to overcome this barrier. In everyday conversations you will be able to take the opportunity to share the gospel by using this introduction, which you can remember by the acrostic S.H.A.R.E.

#### 1) Secular Life

As you talk with friends and acquaintances, you'll often have the opportunity to guide the conversation by choosing the topics. People typically are interested in talking about themselves. Begin by asking basic questions about their secular life-family, occupation, hometown, etc. As you talk, be aware of areas of need or problems they are experiencing.

#### 2) Home Church

Though some nonbelievers feel threatened when asked about their spiritual life, they are generally open to talking about their church involvement. During your conversation, simply ask if they belong to a church, or ask about their church background. This is particularly easy to ask if your friend has visited your church.

#### 3) Attendance At Church

Having introduced the subject of church involvement, ask your friend how actively he has attended church. Be sure not to show any disapproval if he has rarely attended.

#### 4) Reasons For The Church

Continue discussing the church in the following manner. "The important thing, really, is not whether we are Methodists, Baptists or Presbyterians. The important thing is that the church is doing its job. In my opinion, the church's primary responsibility is to do all it can to help people find purpose for living, freedom—that is, the power to do what one knows he should do, not the license to do what he wants to do—and assurance of eternal life. Would you agree?"



# 5) Exploratory Question

Continue the conversation in this way. "Of course, there are other things the church should do. But it seems to me that these are the main reasons for its existence. And yet, I have found that it's quite common for someone to grow up in churcheven be quite active in it—and fail to experience purpose, freedom and assurance of eternal life."

"Tom, do you feel the church has helped you to know this kind of purpose and freedom in life? What about assurance—has the church helped you find assurance that when you die you will spend eternity in heaven?"

- If the person says "no" to the last question, respond by saying, "Could I show you a simple diagram that helps explain how to experience this purpose, freedom, and assurance?"
- If the person answers "yes", respond by saying "Great! How did you come to this assurance in your life?" As he explains, if you doubt whether he really understands the gospel and His need, ask, "Can I show you an interesting diagram? It really helped me understand how to have purpose, freedom and assurance." (See Tool #4)



#### 2. SPIRITUAL JOURNEY QUESTIONS

- 1) Where Are You In Your Spiritual Journey?
- 2) Do You Have Any Spiritual Interests?
- 3) How Would Describe Your Spiritual Journey So Far?
- 4) To What Degree Would You Say You Are Experiencing Life Satisfaction?"

Sample: "You know, as long as we've been friends, I don't think I've ever asked you ..."

#### 3. THE ANSWER

The Answer is a brief book that explains that human quest for glory, grace and truth. It is an engaging and enjoyable read that will prove useful for introducing people on your prayer list to the gospel.

"I pray that you may be active in sharing your faith, so that you will have a full understanding of every good thing we have in Christ."

# 1) Introducing *The Answer* (Conversation Suggested Outline)

(1) Spiritual interest?

"Do you have any interest in spiritual things?"

Actively listen to his/her answer.

(2) Spiritual journey?

"How would you describe your spiritual journey so far?"

Actively listen to his/her answer.

"In my spiritual journey, I've discovered that the understanding of three words answered my main questions about how to have a healthy, meaningful, spiritual life—glory, grace, and truth."

(3) Heard about The Answer?

"Have you heard about a little book called *The Answer* that explains these three words?"

Actively listen to his/her answer.

"I keep a copy with me and I'd be happy to give it to you if you would be interested in reading it."

(4) Want The Answer?

"Would you like a copy?"

If yes ...

"After you've read it I'd especially like to know what you think about the last four pages. I think you'll find them especially helpful."



# 2) Follow-up From Giving *The Answer* (Conversation Suggested Outline)

(1) Read The Answer?

"Did you get a chance to read The Answer?"

Actively listen to his/her answer.

(2) What did you think?

"What did you think about it?"

Actively listen to his/her answer.

"In the last few pages, the author mentioned the idea of investigating a more intentional spiritual journey using some 'Cliff notes' type booklets called, Life Issues."

(3) Interested In Life Issues?

"Do you have any interest in seeing these booklets?"

If yes ...

"I enjoy meeting with people to help them walk through a spiritual investigation. Some are uncertain about their religious beliefs, while others admit that their beliefs aren't firm convictions that positively impact the way they think and live. In either case, people benefit from going through these booklets with someone they can bounce their questions off."

(4) Want to investigate?

"Would you be interested in trying the first booklet with me to see if it is helpful to you?"

If yes ....

"Okay, Let's investigate this way: First, read the short introduction. Then, every day read some from the chapters from John's Gospel. In about a week we'll get together again to discuss your thoughts and questions."



#### 4. THE INTRODUCTORY DIAGRAM

Objectives: The primary goal of the diagram is to invite your friend to do an investigation over period of four weeks. The diagram explains three drives that we all have and how we can experience purpose, freedom and assurance.

- 1) Diagram Outline
  - (1) The progression of boxes
  - (2) The primary question
    - the wrong answer
    - the correct answer
  - (3) The importance of investigation
    - the wrong approach
    - the best approach

# 2) How To Explain The Diagram


(1) Draw the first box



"Let this box represent a person's life. Man has three basic inner drives - a spiritual drive (that is, the desire or capacity to know and accept God), an intellectual drive (the quest to discover the truth), and a physical drive (the desire to have physical needs met). God's original design for man was for His spiritual drive to be the strongest of His three drives. Whenever a person's spiritual drive is stronger than His physical drive, he enjoys purpose, freedom, and assurance." (Write the initials of these three words on top of the box.)




## (2) Draw the second box



"However, we have all disobeyed God, and the more we go our own way apart from God, the more these inner drives get out of balance. When a person's physical drive becomes stronger than His spiritual drive, He loses His sense of purpose and freedom, and becomes uncertain of His spiritual destiny. Man usually senses His imbalance at this point and often tries to compensate by means of pseudo-spirituality – for example, through morality, religion, good deeds, and things like that." (As you make this last point, draw an extended dotted arrow to show the spiritual drive.)




#### (3) Draw the third box



"Unless something turns us around from the direction we are headed, the spiritual drive will disappear. At this point, one becomes skeptical concerning the existence of God or at least of the reliability of His Word, and as a result His physical drive becomes an uncontrollable sensual drive. Does this make sense to you?"



#### (4) Introduce the primary question



"These boxes are like steps. In reality, this could be a continuum of perhaps hundreds of boxes or steps. But let's say we find ourselves here in this third box. (Draw stick figures on lower box). When we're there, we begin to take a hard look at our lives; asking ourselves where is the greater purpose, freedom, and assurance that we are missing. We happen to notice people who claim to have changed lives, who have found purpose, freedom and assurance after having lived where we are now. (Draw fourth box as shown with another stick man.) After observing their lives, we conclude they are sincere, and that what they have must be genuine. As a result, we begin to ask the question, "How does one get from here (point to lower stick figure) to here (point to the last added box)? I am personally convinced there is one important step that can get someone to this place."

KEY QUESTION: How does one get from here to here?




## (5) Explain the answer

#### • the wrong answer

"Many times we hear preachers and <u>religious people say the answer is</u> found in praying or having an emotional experience, or walking down the <u>aisle of a church</u>. However, many of us have already experienced these things ourselves – or watched others who have had such an experience – <u>but a week or two later, lives really haven't changed. As a result, we end up tagging religion as irrelevant."</u>

#### • the correct answer

"But I am convinced that the church has led us astray with such simplistic answers. The Bible explains one step that, I believe, does lead to genuine purpose, freedom, and assurance – if followed. (Draw the last box as shown.) This step relates to the person of Jesus Christ. (Write the word Christ in the box as shonwbelow.) Now, I realize people have all kinds of opinions as to who He is."





# (6) Emphasize the importance of investigation

"Tom, perhaps you've heard of C. S. Lewis, the great English author, scholar, and professor. Lewis was an agnostic for many years. As an agnostic, he investigated the person of Christ from an intellectual perspective - after which he professed Christ to be God Himself. He felt that everyone, like himself, should have the opportunity to investigate the claims of

C.S. Lewis:

- Lion, Witch and Wardrobe
- Shadowlands
- Friends with JRR Tolkien

Jesus Christ. Lewis said that, as one considers Christ, he must come to one of three conclusions. Either He was a liar because He claimed to be God and knew He wasn't. Or, secondly, He was a lunatic—that is, He was merely a man who claimed to be God and really thought He was. Or, thirdly, He was exactly who He claimed to be, the Lord of the universe." (Lewis states: "I am trying here to prevent anyone saying the really foolish thing that people often say about Him. 'I'm ready to accept Jesus as a great moral teacher, but I don't accept His claim to be God.' That is the one thing we must not say. A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. You must make a choice. Either this man was and is the Son of God or else a madman or something worse.")

"As I considered this myself, I decided if my investigation led me to the conclusion that Jesus was a liar or a lunatic, I would then be fool to follow Him. But if I concluded He was Lord of the universe, I would be a fool of fools not to follow Him."

• the wrong approach to investigation

"Tom, everyone should have the opportunity, if he desires, to investigate the claims of Jesus. But now we have to ask the question, 'How does someone investigate Christ?' Well, obviously the place to start is the Bible. But these days when time is such a precious commodity, few of us would take the time for a lengthy personal investigation. And even if we had the time, most of us would not know where to begin. We would probably start reading in Genesis, stumbling through a bunch of 'begats', start in Leviticus and read about a lot of animals getting killed, and then hit Deuteronomy and find a thousand irrelevant things not to do. Finally, we'd probably lay the Bible down and conclude we just can't understand it."



#### • the correct approach to investigation

"Not only that, but most people like myself don't like to be preached to. We'd rather be given the infomation to study on our own and have a credible reference to whom we may address our questions. It seemed to me that what we need today is a sort of "Cliff Notes" or "Spark Notes" to the critical issues of an investigation. I have four booklets which are designed to help a person in His investigation. Each deals with one critical question. The first booklet deals with the question, "How can Christians say the Bible, written two thousand years ago, can be a perfect writing without error?" The second booklet addresses the question, "How can Christians believe that all people, including good people, deserve eternal punishment?" The third booklet explains why Christians claim that among all the religious leaders, "Jesus Christ is the only way to God." The fourth book asks the question, "What is required to have eternal life?"

#### (7) The invitation

"I know you are as busy as I am, and you're probably not looking for any extra activities, but I would be more than happy to meet with you to look at some of this material. Would you be interested?"

#### (8) The potential assignment

If he answers "yes," schedule a time to meet and say, "Tom, to make this worth our time, let me mention that there are two things you need to do. First, I'd like you to read the short booklet I'll give you each week prior to our meeting. Second, as you come across the questions, look at the Bible reference. Anytime you read something you don't understand or agree with, jot it down on a piece of paper, or make a note in your booklet. Read a little each day and not all in one sitting. The first booklet discusses why Christians believe the Bible is God's Word." (At this time give him Life Issues Book 1 and set up a time for your next appointment.)



# 3) Diagram Outline Review

#### (1) Draw the first box

- Man has always had three basic inner drives; spiritual, intellectual, and physical.
- God's design; Spiritual to be stronger and when so, person enjoys PFA.

#### (2) Draw the second box

- We have all disobeyed God and gone our own way; the inner drives get out of balance.
- When physical is stronger than spiritual, one can lose His sense of PF and be unsure of His spiritual destiny.
- One senses this imbalance and tries to compensate through morality, religion, good deeds, etc. (Draw extended dotted arrow to show spiritual drive.)

#### (3) Draw the third box

- Unless something turns us around, we will gradually see the spiritual drive disappear.
- One can become skeptical of God or the reliability of His Word and the physical drive becomes an uncontrollable sensual desire.

#### (4) Introduce primary question (How does one get from here to here?)

- Lets say we find ourselves in the third box. (Draw stick figure over third box.)
- When there, we begin to ask ourselves if we are missing PFA. We meet people who claim to have found PFA. (Draw fourth box at top right.)
- We ask: "How does one get from here (Point to lower stick figure) to here?" (Point to the top right box.)
- I'm convinced there is one important step that can get someone from here to here.

#### The Wrong Answer (go to church, etc.)

- We may hear religious people say the answer is in praying or having an emotional experience, or walking down the aisle of a church.
- We see those whose lives haven't really changed.

## The Correct Answer (Christ)

- Bible does explain one step that leads to genuine PFA, if followed. (Draw the last box.)
- Step relates to the person of Jesus Christ. (Write the word Christ in the box.)
- Now I realize people have all kinds of opinions as to who He is.



- (5) Emphasize the importance of investigation (C. S. Lewis)
  - C. S. Lewis, the great English author, scholar and professor was an agnostic.
  - He investigated from intellectual perspective and professed Christ to be God.
  - Lewis said that as one considers Christ, he must come to one of three conclusions:
    - 1. Liar-Claimed to be God but wasn't.
    - 2. Lunatic-Merely a man who claimed to be God and thought He was.
    - 3. Lord-He was exactly who He claimed to be, Lord of the Universe.

#### Wrong Approach to Investigation (Read the Bible cover to cover)

- Start in the Bible, but many of us don't have time or we don't know where to begin.
- Once we start, we may just lay the Bible down, conclude we don't understand.

## Correct Approach to Investigation (Cliff Notes)

- We'd like to have the information and study on our own.
- We need "Cliff Notes."
- Three of these Life Issues booklets deal with critical guestions:
  - How can Christians say the Bible, written 2,000 years ago, can be a perfect writing without error?
  - How can Christians believe that all people, including good people, deserve eternal punishment?
  - Why do Christians claim that among all the religious leaders, Jesus is the only way to God?
- Life Issues Book 4 deals with: How does one have eternal life?

#### (6) The invitation

- I know you're busy, but I'd be happy to meet with you to look at some of this material.
- Would you be interested?

#### (7) The general assignment

- Answers Yes? Schedule time and ask the person to read the short booklet you'll give them prior to the meeting
- If you come across a Bible reference, look it up.
- If you read something you don't understand or agree with, jot it down (Give him Life Issues Book 1 and set up a time for the next appointment)




("Life Issues" Books)

The following information is provided as an additional resource as you begin to walk through the Life Issues booklets with someone. Each booklet has several questions to assist you as you discuss the Gospel of John. Those questions are answered below for you convenience. In addition to the provided answers there is additional information included that was covered during the Express Your Faith Seminar. This information was transcribed from Randy Pope's training during the seminar. The transcription has been modified and shortened for reading ease. If you would like to review the instruction on the Life Issues booklets, locate the audio (MP3) links within the seminar guidebook.

When someone accepts the invitation to do an investigation, you should assume that this is going to be an experience that they will find enjoyable and interesting. One of the key things to remember during the investigation is how easily one can be embarrassed simply because they do not know the answers to the questions in the booklets. Part of your responsibility is to minimize that embarrassment. Remember this is a time for investigation that values brevity and privacy. As you walk through this information with the person you are meeting with remember this time is meant to answer their questions and to expose them to the Word of God. If you do not know the answer to one of their questions do not hesitate to say that you really don't know the answer but you will have an answer for them by the next meeting. By the time you complete these four booklets they will have had the opportunity to investigate and will have many of their questions answered.














#### 2. "LIFE ISSUES" BOOK 1 - THE HOOK (JOHN 1-5)

## 1) To Whom Does 'The Word' Refer? Why Is The Name Used? (Jn. 1:1, 14)

This question may be difficult for some. Read John 1:14 from the Gospel of John. After reading that verse the answer becomes a little more apparent—Jesus. The second part of this question may be more challenging. The name Word is used because it represents a conversation between two parties. God is one party and the human race is the other party. Jesus, God's Son, is the "communication link" that allows us to have conversation with God.

#### 2) How Did The World Receive The Word? (Jn. 1:10)

A reading of the Bible and history shows us that Jesus, the Word, was not received well.

[Additional thought: Yes, Jesus was ultimately crucified, but as you read the stories of His early interactions with the people He encountered one could easily conclude that He was enthusiastically embraced by those who came in contact with Him. The Jewish people were anticipating the arrival of a Messiah. They had a sense that when the Messiah came He would deliver them from Roman occupation. So when Jesus came and performed miracles they immediately hailed Him as the Messiah. However, as His ministry among the people continued His message became repulsive to them, particularly to the religious leaders, even to the point of them wanting to kill Him despite the fact that so many people were attracted to Him.]


#### 3) Why Was Christ Called The Lamb Of God? (Jn. 1:39)

The correct answer for this question requires some understanding of the Old Testament. When John the Baptist referred to Jesus as the "Lamb of God," he was referring to the Passover that the Jewish people would have understood. Just as a lamb without blemish was used to pay for the sins of the people now this "God-Lamb" was coming to pay the penalty for the sins of the human race.

# 4) What Is The Significance Of Christ's Words, 'Destroy This Temple And In Three Days I Will Raise It Up'? (Jn. 2:19)

The contrast in this question is between the physical structure, the Temple, and Jesus' reference to Himself as the temple that is to be destroyed and raised in three days. This is His first reference to His death and resurrection.





# 5) What Did Jesus Mean When He Told Nicodemus He Must Be Born Again? (Jn. 3:3)

Jesus was referring to a rebirth that can only be brought about by God. Even though the words "born again" may seem misplaced or reflective of language that is offensive, it is the language that Jesus used.

[Additional thought: Before you answer this question you may want to illustrate how words can be misleading in the way they are used today. Draw the six boxes. In the first three label them as you see below. As you draw the boxes ask the individual to pick a box that describes where they think they are.

Not a Christian Christian Born Again


Most people say they are "A Christian" and the balance usually say they are "Not a Christian." You may want to clarify at this point that they are saying that they are not "A Born Again Christian."

In the second row of boxes label them as you see below.

Not Pregnant Semi-Pregnant Pregnant

[In this illustration, imagine a woman who wants to be pregnant. What are the possible options? She could be "Not Pregnant" or she could be "Pregnant." What would you say to a woman who said she was "Semi-Pregnant?" One might conclude that the woman does not understand pregnancy. The point that is to be made here is that Jesus used the word "born again" to describe a person who is properly relating to Him. So the Born Again Christian is the proper way to describe someone in a relationship with Jesus. As confusing as it may seem at this time, by the end of the investigation it will be clear.]





6) What Did Jesus Say Was Necessary To Have Eternal Life? (Jn. 3:15) "Believe" is what Jesus said was necessary for eternal life.

[Additional thought: To illustrate the word believe the story of the tightrope walker is helpful here. The tightrope walker walked across Niagara Falls on a tightrope and returned without incident. He then took a wheelbarrow across the falls and again returned without incident. He then asked the crowd if they thought He could do it again with someone in the wheelbarrow, and they enthusiastically said yes. He pointed to someone in the crowd who seemed most enthusiastic and asked them to climb into the wheelbarrow, and they refused. Why? Because they believed in their mind He could do it, but they did not believe in their heart that He could do it with them in the wheelbarrow. It has been observed that there will be some people who will miss heaven by a mere eighteen inches, the distance from their head to their heart. This is what the word "believe" means, to trust and to take into your heart.]

- 7) What Is The Significance Of Christ's Claim To Be The Messiah? (Jn. 4:26)

  Christ claimed to be God. This bold assertion by Jesus stands in opposition to those who say He never claimed to be God. Furthermore He makes this claim in other situations throughout the Gospel of John.
- 8) How Did Jesus Describe His Relationship With The Father? (Jn. 5:18-24) He said He and God were one. So again Jesus claimed equality with God.
- 9) Can Someone Be In Right Relationship With God With Out Being In Right Relationship With Christ? (Jn. 5:23)

After working through the questions up to this point, there is a strong likelihood that the correct answer will be given, which is No. This may not mean they agree, but it is difficult for them to deny this answer based solely on the chapters they have read so far.

Upon completing *Life Issues* Book 1, the goal is to create interest in continuing the investigation and moving on to *Life Issues* Book 2. ## HOW CAN THE BIBLE BE GOD'S WORD WITHOUT ERROR?

Five realities which make it reasonable to believe that the Bible is God's Word.

#### 1. The Bible's historical reliability

Louis Markos, Apologetics for the 21st Century, p. 146

In order to substantiate the basic claims of Christ and the essential doctrines of Christianity, the apologist need not prove the inspiration or inerrancy of the Bible; he need only show the Bible to be reliable in its account of Jewish and Christian history.

- 1) Dates, Places, People, Storyline
- 2) Archeological discoveries

#### William F. Albright (Archeologist)

Discovery after discovery has established the accuracy of the innumerable details and has brought increased recognition to the value of the Bible as a source of history.

### Nelson Glueck, Rivers in the desert, p. 136 (Jewish Author)

It may be stated categorically that no archaeological discovery has ever controverted a biblical reference. Scores of archaeological findings have been made which confirm in clear outline or exact detail historical statements in the Bible. And, by the same token, proper evaluation of biblical descriptions has often led to amazing discoveries.

#### A.H. Sayce (Oxford Professor & Archeologist)

Time after time the…assertions of a skeptical criticism have been disproved by archaeological discovery, events and personages that were confidently pronounced to be mythical have been shown to be historical, and the older writers have turned out to have been better acquainted with what they were describing than the modern critic who has flouted them.

Viewed merely as an ancient text, it would be regarded by all serious & honest scholars as probably the most reliable historical text of the ancient world.

#### WHAT ABOUT EVOLUTION?

#### 1. Realities to be considered

Jefrey Breshears, An Introduction to Bibliology, pg. 122

Not only does the Bible support modern cosmology (including an instantaneous creation and the constant expansion of the universe), but it did so more than 3,000 years ago in stark contrast to all other ancient cosmological theories and long before Moses and other writers of the texts would have known the truth about such phenomena. Indeed, the Bible describes features of the universe that would not be discovered until recent times. This knowledge is only explicable in terms of supernatural revelation.

- 1) Now agreeing —outside power would be required to start the universe
- 2) No evidence to show living creatures produce outside its own kind

Stephen J. Gould (agnostic scientist)

Species exhibit no directional change during their tenure on earth. They appear in the fossil record looking much the same as when they finally disappear.

#### 2. The Logic that an Incredible Design Requires a Designer

- 1) Illustration of an iphone
- 2) Facts about human DNA:
  - The human cell has 46 chromosomes that are built like little ladders
  - There are 6 billion rungs within the DNA ladders of each cell
  - If you spliced together and stretched out the rungs of the 46 chromosomes, each cell would be 2 meters long
  - The average human body has about 100 trillion cells, so if you spliced together and stretched out the DNA within the human body there would be 200 trillion meters of DNA
  - That would be the distance between the earth and the sun multiple times
  - In many diseases only 1 rung of a single chromosome will be impaired

### 3. Facts about the human heart:

- The heart is a pump, usually beating about 60 to 100 times per minute. With each heartbeat, the heart sends blood throughout our bodies, carrying oxygen to every cell. After delivering the oxygen, the blood returns to the heart. The heart then sends the blood to the lungs to pick up more oxygen. This cycle repeats over and over again. The human heart beats 2 billion times over a 70 year period.



- Your heart pumps blood around the body all the time about 5 litres (8 pints) of it. This is called circulation. Your heart, blood and blood vessels together make up your cardiovascular system (or heart and circulatory system)
- The blood vessels carry blood away from and towards the heart. Arteries carry blood away from the heart and veins carry blood back to the heart.
- The circulatory system carries oxygen, nutrients, and hormones to cells, and removes waste products, like carbon dioxide. These roadways travel in one direction only, to keep things going where they should.
- At each body part, a network of tiny blood vessels called capillaries connects the very small artery branches to very small veins. The capillaries have very thin walls, and through them, nutrients and oxygen are delivered to the cells. Waste products are brought into the capillaries. (The system that contains the heart and the blood vessels and moves blood throughout the body.) This system helps tissues get enough oxygen and nutrients, and it helps them get rid of waste products.
- The body is made up of 100 trillion cells and every cell needs oxygen every second.
- By adulthood, we each have 60,000 miles of blood vessels inside our bodies that's more than twice the distance around the world. Those vessels keep blood flowing, supplying your tissues with oxygen and nutrients, and keeping your organs, including the heart, healthy.

#### 4. Facts about the human brain:


- The human brain weighs 3 pounds and represents 2% of the weight of the body. It is 75% water and is the fattest organ in the body. It is 60% fat. The brain is the seat of intelligence and is the crown jewel of the human body. It can process 400 billion bits of information per second and runs on 12 watts of power (20% of the body's energy).
- The primary functional unit is a microscopic cell in the brain called the neuron. All sensations, movements, thoughts, memories, and feelings are the result of signals that pass through neurons.
- The brain has 86 billion neurons and 400 miles of capillaries (blood vessels).
- These neurons make 10 quadrillion calculations per second.
- The neurons make 500 million connections through their branch system performing a dazzling array of mental processes every second including sensations and perceptions, how we reason, how we think, our emotions, our mental images, our attention span, and learning; memory which is essentially a pattern of connections between neurons.
- A piece of brain matter the size of a grain of sand has 100,000 neurons with 2 million axons (transmission lines from the neurons) and one billion synapses (small gap at the end of the neuron that allows a signal to pass from one neuron to the next).







## 2. "LIFE ISSUES" BOOK 2 - THE HOOK (JOHN 6-10)

1) What Does Jesus Mean When He Says He Is The Bread Of Life? (Jn. 6:35)

Just as "bread" is needed for nourishment and survival, Jesus spoke of being the bread of life that alone has the ability to satisfy our ultimate needs.

[Additional thought: The Story of Glory can be helpful here to provide an overview of the Biblical story. There are six "chapters" to this story but at this time the first four chapters are all that are necessary to share. Chapter 1 is "Designed with Glory," the glory (glory is defined as renown) that God has placed in our life. In creation mankind was conceived in glory and born into glory but this glory was lost when Adam sinned. This leads to Chapter 2, "Fall from Glory." That glory was stripped away because of sin. Chapter 3 is the "Search for Glory." Our lives, from infancy to death, are an unending search for glory to replace that glory that was forfeited. Any time we go after anything other than Jesus to satisfy this longing, it's a false glory. We refer to this as counterfeit glory. Chapter 4 is the "Discovery of Glory." Colossians 1:27, describes Jesus as the hope of glory. So in Jesus we find the ultimate satisfaction we long for that will never be fully and completely satisfied by things in this world.]


2) What Does Jesus Mean When He Keeps Saying That His Time Has Not Yet Come? (Jn. 7:8, 30)

His time has not come to die. He knew when He would die; He knew how He would die, it was part of a plan.

3) In Jesus' Teaching, What Did He Say Was The Consequence Of Not Believing That He Was The Christ (The Messiah Of The Old Testament)? (Jn. 8:24)

He clearly said that we would all die in our sins. Jesus spoke as though He alone was the answer. The next question and answer speaks to this more clearly. Jesus taught that to be His disciple meant to follow His Word.





## 4) What Does It Mean To Hold To His Teaching? (Jn. 8:31)

Jesus clearly taught that those who follow His teaching will follow Him. Over the next two booklets He is going to make this point again.

[Additional thought: It is not uncommon to see people who say they are spiritual and may very well be faithful attenders of a local church. However, as you have the opportunity to observe their lives there are inconsistencies. In fact, they are not really following Jesus at all. Everyone stumbles and falls from time to time, but the effort and intention is to be a faithful follower of Jesus.]

## 5) What Does It Mean To Be Free? (Jn. 8:32-36)

To be free is to have the ability to do what we should do, not the license to do whatever we want to do.

[Additional thought: The train illustration may be helpful here. Imagine a train that decides that real freedom is the ability to go where there are no tracks. As it leaves the constraints imposed on it through the tracks, the train has a euphoric sense of freedom for a few seconds and then it crashes and tears into pieces. The greatest freedom is available to the train by staying on the tracks. God has given us "tracks", it is on those tracks that we find the ability to do what we should do.]


# 6) The Jews Of Jesus' Day Certainly Had A Strong Belief In God. Did Jesus Accept Such A Belief As Sufficient? (Jn. 8:38-47)

Jesus did not think this was sufficient. In many of Jesus' comments He insisted that the only way to the Father was through Him. Belief in God is not enough; one must come through Jesus to have a relationship with God.

# 7) What Did Jesus Mean When He Said, 'I Tell You The Truth, Before Abraham Was Born, I Am'? (Jn. 8:58)

This particular statement refers back to Hebrew language that deals with existence and being. In this comment Jesus told those with whom He was speaking that before Abraham existed, He was. How could this be, He was only in His early thirties? This was not about His chronological age. Jesus claimed that He was preexistent. Once again Jesus claimed to be God.





# 8) What Does Jesus Mean When He Said, 'I Am The Door For The Sheep'? (Jn. 10:7)

We all know that a door allows one to enter and exit. Jesus said for those who are a part of His flock, they will come in through Him. He is the door to the Father. This claim by Jesus to being the exclusive entry is not something that His followers claimed for Him; this was His claim.

## 9) Why Did The Jews Want To Kill Jesus? (Jn. 10:30-33)

Because Jesus claimed to be God the religious leaders wanted to kill Him for what they perceived was blasphemy.

#### Transition From Life Issues Book 2 To Life Issues Book 3:

Life Issues Book 2 is one of the hardest of the four booklets. The next book answers the question, 'how can we believe that Jesus is the only way to God?' Assuming the person you are meeting with is doing their work and is finding this a worthwhile experience give them Life Issues Book 3 and schedule the next meeting. Remind them to read a little of the Gospel of John each day.

Life Issues Book 3 is a little easier to understand. Miracles were a prominent part of Jesus' earthly ministry. It is interesting that during Jesus' ministry there was really no dispute about the fact that He performed miracles. The dispute was how and when He did the miracles. Among the miracles surrounding Jesus, the centerpiece of the Christian faith is the resurrection. If the resurrection took place as described in the Bible then the claims of Jesus and the Christian faith are strongly supported. If the resurrection did not take place, then the Christian faith becomes less compelling.

First required statement to become a believer is that we have to believe we are a sinner deserving to be separated from God. Second required statement, we must believe that Christ alone paid the penalty. If we believe number one and thus agree that there is a problem then it follows that number two provides us with the solution.

2. I am wiser than God regarding what I need and therefore my agenda is better than God's agenda.

#### Two Presuppositions of the Christian Faith

- 1. No one deserves good from God
- 2. Man is never wiser than God regarding what man needs and, therefore, man's agenda is never as good as God's agenda.

There are more important things to God than keeping sinful man from suffering.

Joni Eareckson Tada

God allows what He hates to accomplish what He loves.

#### Three Things God Loves

1. He loves exposing man's sin so as to make him seek God.

When God Weeps, Tada & Estes, pg. 142 & 143

The beauty of being exposed and empty is that God can then cover you. Like a surface that must be scrubbed clean before you can bond anything to it, the bonding of intimacy between God and us won't adhere until the film of dirt goes, the ambitions, the vanity, everything that sets itself up against others and God....Affliction is the gristmill where pride is reduced to powder, leaving our souls naked, bare, and bonded to Christ. And it feels beautiful.

2. He loves perfecting a person's inner being, keeping his heart where it was designed to be.







## 2. "LIFE ISSUES" BOOK 3 - THE HOOK (JOHN 11-15)

- 1) What Did Jesus Mean When He Said, 'I Am The Resurrection'? (Jn. 11:25)

  When Jesus said He was the resurrection He claimed to have the power to overcome death. Once again He claims a power that would have been reserved for God. So what are the implications of the resurrection? If He overcame death, then any and everything He has promised, we can count on Him being able to bring to pass.
- 2) What Does Christ Being The Resurrection Mean For Those Who Believe? (Jn. 11:26)

If Jesus can overcome death then He has the ability to do everything that He has promised that He would do. He can be counted on as being true to His own word.

- 3) What Is The One Condition Jesus Gives For Finding Life? (Jn. 12:25-26) It is somewhat counterintuitive, but Jesus said that the condition for finding one's life is to lose it. Christ becomes primary in our life. Our ambitions, our hopes and our dreams have true significance with Jesus as the primary part of our life.
- 4) What Does Jesus Say Is True Of A Person Who Serves Him? (Jn. 12:26)
  The person who serves Jesus is one who is following. This is similar to the answer in *Life Issues* Book 2 question 4.





5) In Jesus' View, Is There Any Other Way Than Believing And Following Him In Order For A Person To Find God? (Jn. 14:6)

No, Jesus was clear to those who heard Him speak. In order to find God one must believe and follow.

[Additional thought: This question of the exclusivity that Jesus claimed for Himself is a good place to deal with the topic of intolerance. The best way to address this is to refer to the cookie illustration. The cookie illustration deals with a poisoned cookie, knowledge and responsibility to the person to whom the cookie is given. Is it intolerant to stop him or her from eating a poisoned cookie? The reason it would not be considered intolerant is because you have information that makes you knowledgeable of a potential danger of which he or she is unaware. This illustration on intolerance nicely transitions to the concern that if the claims of Christianity are true then there is a danger that could result in an eternity of regret. This belief is why Christians do what they do, some do it poorly or inappropriately, but it is not because they are intolerant.]

- 6) How Does Jesus Describe His Relationship With The Father? (Jn. 14:9-11)

  This answer is similar to the question covered in the other in the preceding books.

  Jesus said that He and the Father were one.
- 7) What Does Christ Promise To Those Who Will Ask Him Anything That Honors Him? (Jn. 14:13-14)

Jesus assured that He will answer our prayers.

[Additional thought: At this point you may encounter some strong emotions. It is not uncommon for someone to arrive at this question and in the discussion reveal that they had a significant disappointment with God and His failure to answer their prayers sometime in their past that they asked with a sincere heart. Tread lightly here and provide them with some instruction that shows that this particular verse is a part of many other verses that provide guidance on what one can expect in answered prayer. This verse needs to be viewed as one verse among many that forms a collage on prayer. People who make it their job to study matters like these have said that the scriptures lay out sixteen unique conditions to answered prayer. To name a few, one must ask believing, one must ask in the name of Jesus and one must ask with proper motives. The illustration of your child participating in "coachpitched" baseball may be helpful in driving this point home.]





8) What Is True Of Those Who Truly Love Christ? (Jn. 14:15, 21-24) They're going to follow.

[Additional thought: You should recall the teaching on the parable of the soils that was given in the EXPRESS Your Faith seminar. If one has believed and is following Jesus there will be fruit as he or she is being faithful. The level of fruitfulness is the responsibility of God. All He asks of us is to be faithful.]

9) What Does Jesus Mean When He Says He Will Leave A Helper? (Jn. 14:16-26) Jesus' reference to the helper is an assurance given to His disciples and to followers in our own time that we will not be left alone. The Holy Spirit is given to us as a helper in our life.

[Additional thought: The idea of the Holy Spirit may be foreign to the person you are meeting with during this investigation. You can give a very simple overview of the fact that God is one God with three distinct persons, Father, Son and Spirit. You can draw the analogy of water that exists in three states (liquid, solid and steam) but in each state it is still water ( $H_2O$ ). One major difference with this analogy of the water and God is that God doesn't have to move from one state to the other. This should help to provide a basic understanding of God.]





Life Issues Book 4 is on the topic of faith and repentance. In covering the material in Life Issues Book 3 make sure that you leave enough time in your appointment to set up Life Issues Book 4. In Life Issues Book 4 the primary question is, 'What does Jesus say is required to have eternal life?' On page 5 there is a prayer that models a prayer that has often been used by people to express their desire to become a follower.

Based upon how the time has gone over the last three weeks, you may want to challenge the person to read this prayer and decide if it reflects the desire of their heart. This prayer is one of the most misunderstood things that Christians talk about and it is important to understand what this prayer represents. The prayer should be viewed as a ceremony. Like a wedding ceremony, the prayer is an acknowledgement that something has happened. A wedding ceremony is the celebration of two people who are in love and have decided to make a life together. The couple may not be able to tell the day, the hour or the minute they fell in love, but when they arrive at the wedding ceremony they are in love. This prayer is similar to the wedding ceremony. It is a celebration of something that has taken place.

Before you have your meeting, finish by showing him what is called "The Cloud of Doubt." Let me explain.





#### THE CLOUD OF DOUBT

To illustrate this share the illustration, The Cloud of Doubt. There are four different stations that could depict where someone is in their spiritual pilgrimage. The line in the middle of the continuum represents the point when a person truly becomes a Christian.



As you can see there are four stations on the continuum. Station one is, 'I know I'm not a Christian; station two, 'I may be a Christian; I have doubts, but I'm not sure.' But in reality, this person is not a Christian; station three, 'I don't know where I am. I think I'm a Christian, but I'm not sure.' But in reality, they have crossed the line; and finally station four, they know they are a Christian and there is enough evidence to support that assertion. The beauty of this illustration is that within the cloud of doubt a person could be at station 2 or station 3, share similar characteristics with one another, they both labor under a cloud of uncertainty, they are in a cloud of doubt. As you leave your week three appointment, ask the person you are meeting with to evaluate where they think they may be on this continuum. When you are together the next time you will revisit this illustration.

On the fourth and final week ask them if they did the homework assignment and prayed the prayer on page 5 of Life Issues Book 4. Review the significance of the prayer. Remind them that it is a ceremony and as such it does not create love it is designed to celebrate the love that exists. This is not designed to make you a Christian; it is designed to celebrate what you sense has been a birth of love in your heart.








In your fourth and final meeting, before you get into the material in Life Issues Book 4, draw the cloud of doubt illustration again. Ask them to mark where they think they were on the continuum when this investigation began. After they have done that, now ask them to mark where they are now. If there is an indication that they have moved from stations 1 or 2 to stations 3 or 4, ask them how they think that happened. If there is a sense that something has changed in the individual's evaluation of where they were this may present an opportunity to help them take the next steps.

This last week, I will not focus on the questions in John. After completing our discussion re: the requests for eternal life, I want to spend my time assessing where the person is in their spiritual journey and what, if anything, has taken place. Once that has been done, review faith and repentance. Make sure they understand what each of these words mean. Your next steps will be based upon their response to your question of where they think they are on the continuum. The investigation has now concluded. Just as you promised, they had the opportunity to investigate and can be satisfied that they have done so. With that you are finished with Life Issues Book 4.

Though I have put the answers for questions for John 16-21 in our notes, I do not go through them in our next meeting. I ask if they have any questions regarding what they've read in John 14-21, and try to answer any questions they may ask.





## 2. "LIFE ISSUES" BOOK 4 - THE HOOK (JOHN 16-21)

1) Why Is It Better That Jesus Left Earth So That The Helper Could Come? (Jn. 16:7-15)

Because it was for our good that if Christ had not gone away the Spirit of Truth would not be with each of us. And the Spirit of Truth speaks God's words to us, which guides and teaches and counsels us.

2) What Was Jesus Referring To When He Said, "In A Little While You Will See Me No More, And Then After A Little While You See Me"? (Jn. 16:16)

"A little while—a few more hours!—and I will be taken away from you, for I will be put to death and buried. Hence, you will observe me no longer. But I will not remain away from you. Rising gloriously on the third day, I will usher in the dispensation of the Spirit. In and by means of the mighty works which He will perform on earth, you will see me."

3) Who Is Jesus Praying For In Chapter 17 And Why?

Christ is praying for His followers at the time of His death and for all those after who will believe in Christ through the message of those followers alive at His death.

4) Pilate Raises A Very Important Question In 18:38 "What Is Truth?" How Would You Define Truth? (note vs. 37)

Christ is the truth, i.e., He is the embodiment of the truth. He is the truthful source of how one received eternal life versus the lie of Satan as seen in any other religions or beliefs.


5) Why Did Jesus Permit These Jews To Torture Him The Way They Did? (Jn. 19:10-11)

Because it was the Father's plan, and Jesus always did the Father's will.

6) Chapters 20 & 21 Tell The Story Of Resurrection Of Jesus. If The Resurrection Is Historical Fact, What Are The Implications For You? (Chapters 20 & 21)

That Jesse's prophetic words were true and that He is now with the Father in Heaven, and I can believe everything He said including His dying for my sins and that by grace I have been saved through faith, THE gift from God.





7) What Response To His Life And Ministry Does Jesus Want To See In Us? (Jn. 21:20-25)

To obey and follow Him.

#### **FOLLOW-UP TOOLS**

It is a natural part of the process to share the good news of the gospel and have people respond in a favorable way. As emphasized in the training, this is the work of the Holy Spirit, therefore relieving you of the burden that it hinges on how persuasive you are in your presentation. As was stated in the training, God has designed this in such a way that He delights in using His people, you and me, and His word in the process of drawing people to Himself.

#### 1. IMMEDIATE FOLLOW-UP

There are three wonderful gifts that should gradually begin to be experienced in the lives of those who put their trust in Jesus: purpose, freedom and assurance. You will want to explain this to your friend.

#### 1) Purpose

Is there a sense that their purpose in life is going to change? They may have for the first time in their lives an awareness that God must be brought into the conversational mix as they rethink their life purpose. Help them understand what that may look like for them.

#### 2) Freedom

As they grasp that they are forgiven they may experience, for the first time, true freedom. They may have been in bondage for years and now have a sense of release. Of course, it will take a lifetime to fully comprehend, but you should encourage them as they become aware of their newfound freedom.

#### 3) Assurance

Finally, assure them of their salvation. It is not based upon their feelings. Their feelings will change. It is not based upon emotion. Their emotions will swing to the positive and to the negative. For the one who has come into a personal relationship with Christ, there will be changes. Begin to look for increasing evidences of the fruit of the Spirit in their life. As they see the fruit of the Spirit in their lives and see it increasing, they will grow in their assurance. A sincere faith in Christ will always be accompanied by a changed life.



There are also numerous promises that God makes to all who truly become His followers and you will want to share them with your friend.






